Travis County 4-H Consumer Decision-Making Team Shines in Competition

The Senior team included Meredith Masi, Anna Dolliver, Collin

Warwick, and Trent Warwick. The Travis County seniors won second overall at the San Antonio contest out of 47 teams. Meredith Masi led the team to the win with the highest individual score out of 153 senior contestants, earning herself a \$10,000 scholarship to any Texas state college or university. Three Intermediate teams also competed.



The District 10 4-H Consumer Decision Making Contest was held in conjunction with the S.A.L.E. contest. The Senior team took first place in district competition, earning them the right to compete at Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station on June 11. Masi also took first place in the district contest. Intermediate teams took first, second and fourth place. At the San Angelo Livestock Show, the Senior team took first place overall and the Intermediate team took fourth place out of 18 teams.

"The Consumer Decision-Making Contest requires a variety of skills in order to do well," Talley said. "Members can participate as part of a team or as an individual. Each contestant is given a series of eight scenarios. With each scenario, the individual has to rank consumer product choices from one through four.

"After ranking products, each contestant then takes a turn giving a two-minute speech to a panel of judges, giving reasons for why they ranked the items as they did, given the scenario. This requires concentration, thinking on the spot, as well as good public-speaking skills." Talley said coordinating opportunities to practice these skills throughout the year is part of 4-H program activities.

East Austin Garden Fair "A Passion for Plants"

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Travis County Master Gardeners Association and City of Austin presented the 8th annual "A Passion for Plants" East Austin Garden Fair April 12 at Zaragoza Park, 2608 Gonzales St., Austin.



Hundreds attended the fair, which was free and open to the public, said Lisa Anhaiser, the Travis County Master Gardener who coordinated the event. "We had lots of hands-on demonstrations and activities to involve both adults and kids in creative, low-cost ways to grow food and ornamental plants, improve their diet and green up their homes," Anhaiser said.

Fair attendees also got expert advice from Travis County Master Gardener volunteers on all aspects of gardening and composting, plus information on additional topics, said Daphne Richards, AgriLife Extension horticulturist for Travis County who oversees the county's Master Gardener program.

Richards said activities and practical demonstrations included garden planning, composting, butterfly gardening, kids' crafts, rainwater harvesting, "firewise" landscaping, vegetable, herb and citrus gardening, and keeping bees and chickens.

"We also had Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program registration counseling, including how to double benefits at farmers markets, along with cooking demonstrations," she said.

Anhaiser and Richards said the fair has become a community "fixture" and that many attendees have

been to the event on more than one occasion. "It's a great event for the entire family, providing practical, helpful information and advice on gardening, nutrition, health, wellness and more, Richards said.



Photography Project Helps Develop Skills in 4-H Youth

Participation in the Travis County Photography Contest was up significantly this year, said 4-H program coordinators at AgriLife Extension.

"Last year we had 86 photos entered into the contest, and this year we were up to 147 entries," said Cory Talley, AgriLife Extension Agent for 4-H and Youth Development in Travis County. "That's an increase of over 70 percent."

Talley said participants included long-time 4-H members from established clubs as well as entries from newly formed 4-H clubs, such as the Campbell Photography 4-H Club, which began meeting in January.

Talley said the contest gives 4-H'ers the opportunity to enter photos in fifteen different categories and three different age groups. Categories include
